

Assessing and Treating Race-Based Traumatic Invalidation

Description

Traumatic invalidation is defined as extreme or repetitive invalidation of a person's significant experiences, characteristics, and reactions (Linehan, 2015). This webinar will provide a deeper dive into a specific form of traumatic invalidation that is based on race. Race-based traumatic invalidation can take many forms and may involve direct exposure (e.g., personally experiencing racial discrimination), vicarious exposure (e.g., seeing videos of police killings of Black people), and cumulative exposure (e.g., repeated microaggressions). Although some race-based traumatic events meet Criterion A for PTSD (e.g., racially motivated physical assaults), most race-based traumatic experiences do not (e.g., verbal harassment and discrimination) but can nonetheless lead to clinically significant and impairing PTSD symptoms. This webinar will define race-based traumatic invalidation and discuss how to effectively assess and treat this form of traumatic invalidation within the framework of DBT PE. Various case examples will be provided to illustrate how to work with clients who have experienced race-based traumatic invalidation, with consideration for how to help clients cope with an ongoing invalidating environment in which racism is likely to persist. Finally, we will discuss the importance of practicing cultural humility when working with clients who have experienced race-based traumatic invalidation, including attending to the unique location perspectives of the therapist and client.

- 1. Define the concept of race-based traumatic invalidation.
- 2. Apply strategies for assessing and treating race-based traumatic invalidation.
- 3. Increase cultural humility and awareness of their location perspective.

Instructors

Melanie Harned, PhD, ABPP is a Psychologist and Coordinator of the DBT Program at the VA Puget Sound Health Care System as well as an Associate Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences and Adjunct Associate Professor in the Department of Psychology at the University of Washington. Dr. Harned has previously worked as the Research Director of Dr. Marsha Linehan's Behavioral Research and Therapy Clinics at the University of Washington (2006-2018), Director of Research and Development for Behavioral Tech, LLC (2014-2017), and Director of Behavioral Tech Research, Inc. (2013-2016). Dr. Harned's research focuses on the development and evaluation of the DBT Prolonged Exposure protocol for PTSD as well as methods of disseminating and implementing this and other evidence-based treatments into clinical practice. She regularly provides training and consultation nationally and internationally in DBT and DBT PE and has published extensively on these treatments. She is a certified DBT therapist, a certified PE therapist and consultant, is board certified in Behavioral and Cognitive therapy, and is licensed as a psychologist in the state of Washington.

Natalia Garcia, PhD, is a Psychologist and clinical supervisor in the DBT Program at the VA Puget Sound Health Care System as well as an Acting Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the University of Washington. Dr. Garcia received her DBT training in Dr. Marsha Linehan's Behavioral Research and Therapy Clinics at the University of Washington (2015-2017) and has worked extensively with Dr. Melanie Harned at VA Puget Sound (2019-current) as a member of her DBT consultation team, in addition to collaborating on research projects, invited presentations, and serving as a national consultant for the DBT roll-out across VA. In addition to her extensive training and clinical experience with DBT and DBT PE, Dr. Garcia's primary clinical training and research focus is broadly focused on trauma recovery and PTSD. She has specific interest and expertise in race-based trauma and providing culturally-responsive mental health care, with published research and invited presentations on these topics. She is licensed as a psychologist in the state of Washington.
